## 4. Distribution Requirements: 24 credits

To obtain their distribution requirements, students MUST choose a minimum of two courses from the Science division and four courses from the Humanities $\&$ Art Division (two from the Literature \& Society program and two from Digital Communications Media and the Arts program). A cross-listed course could be used to fulfill both a program requirement and a distribution requirement at the same time.

The other divisions to fulfill are Sciences (Natural Sciences and Computing Division), and Humanities \& Practicing Arts (Literature \& Society and Digital Communications Media and the Arts).

Note: A course in the Human Rights \& International Law program that is cross-listed in another division may be taken either for Human Rights \& International Law program credit or for distribution credit, but not for both.
